


PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The year in review

KSA STILL GOING STRONG AFTER 36 YEARS

The KSA is well into our 36th year of operation. It's but a faint memory when I darkened the door at my first KSA meeting back in 1999. My wife and I had just moved back to Whitehorse after living three years in Ross River where she launched her elementary school teaching ca-



Well, 18 years later, here we are. I've been a member, director, vice-president and, since 2005, president. We've struggled against political, financial and personal challenges and they have all made the KSA a stronger organization. We held our AGM on December 5 when I had the pleasure to yet again report on our progress over the past year to the membership. I'll summarize it



here for the folks who couldn't make the meeting.

I'm happy to report that our financial position remains strong. We don't borrow money and we don't buy things we can't afford. We have either sold or are in the process of selling anything we don't use to keep our operating

expenses low and our storage needs reasonable. Our storage facilities are begged and borrowed and come at no cost to the membership. Our office is in donated space in Jim's house, and we leverage our membership at Sport Yukon to take advantage of its fully staffed storefront presence.

Memberships are at record levels—partly because people appreciate the services we provide and partly because we maintain an excellent member benefits package. A \$20 annual membership can easily save hundreds of dollars on things every Yukoner needs like food, clothing and fuel.

Our trail maintenance equipment is aging but reliable, thanks to conscientious operators and ongoing support from the snow-

▶ mobile dealers and other local businesses. The community values our trail work and they're willing to walk the talk. We did apply for a new grooming unit through the Community Development Fund last year and just heard the great news that they would provide the majority of funding required this spring. Our new grooming unit should be ready to work when the snow flies next winter. Among other benefits, the new Kubota RTV 1100 groomer will have an enclosed and heated cab to keep old Harris out of the weather and firmly planted in his seat.

We didn't initiate any major construction projects this past year but we did close out the South Whitehorse Connectors project from the year prior and we celebrated the upgrade of the Hamilton Boulevard Extension Trail from Falcon

Drive to the underpass with the City of Whitehorse. Rather than building, we spent an enormous amount of time in trail planning processes for Whistlebend, Porter Creek, North Whitehorse and South Whitehorse.

Relationships drive communities and we continued to build on our relationships with the City of Whitehorse, Contagious Mountain Bike Club, Government of Yukon , Canadian Council of Snowmobile Organizations, Whitehorse Cross Country Ski Club, Yukon Sourdough Rendezvous, Yukon Avalanche Association, Yucan Consulting and the Trans Canada Trail, where we raised our public profile with the trail connection celebration event during Rendezvous.

We were the third jurisdiction in Canada to reach connection status—having identified a continuous route through the territory from the border with British Columbia south of Watson Lake to the border with the Northwest Territories on the Dempster Highway. Much of the route is highway right-of-way and is subject to an agreement we have with the Yukon government that is currently up for renegotiation. Work continues to develop new sections of trail and upgrade existing sections.

These are amazing accomplishments for a small group of volunteers. Speaking of volunteers, we held elections at the December AGM and here's your volunteer board of directors for 2016/17: president, Mark Daniels; vice-president, Jim Connor; secretary/treasurer, James Connor; directors, Harris Cox, Jeff Marynowski and Brad Milligan. I'm looking forward to another great year with this great group. ■



Chilkoot Trail National Historic Site

Help us keep sharing the Chilkoot Trail with the world.

It's hard to travel the Chilkoot without experiencing some element of its wild past. Whether it's the story of the Tlingit and Athapaskan First Nations traders and travelers, or the stampede of prospectors making their way to the gold fields in Dawson City, the living history of the Chilkoot Trail has been delighting visitors for decades.

While many of our visitors hike the Chilkoot Trail in the summer, experiencing the area in the winter is a unique privilege that Parks Canada is proud to facilitate for snowmobilers, skiers and snowshoers. With your help, we can keep protecting and sharing this treasure with the world by considering the following:

Reducing conflicts

On any given winter day in the Chilkoot Trail National Historic Site, you might encounter someone skiing, snowshoeing or walking. Snowmobiling is permitted within the site, with the exception of the dates below and the winter-long restricted activity areas at Lindeman and Bennett (see map on facing page). Please slow down and yield when travelling through terrain with limited visibility to reduce the chance of a surprise encounter.

Snowmobiling within the national historic site boundary, including staging, loading and unloading of machines in the Log Cabin parking lot, is prohibited on the following weekends:

- February 17 to 19;
- March 10 to 12 and 24 to 26;
- April 21 to 23.

Protecting the natural environment

Campfires are an enjoyable winter tradition but also a threat to the treasured natural and cultural resources of the Chilkoot Trail. They leave unsightly scars on the ground that can remain visible for years. Camping is permitted in the Log Cabin parking lot between December 1st and May 15th. Campers are required to bring their own wood and keep fires within pans. Open fires are otherwise prohibited within the national historic site.



• equipment tell the story of the thousands of prospectors that tried their luck in the gold rush. Please leave these things in place, exactly as they've been for over 100 years, so those that come after you on the trail can have the same unique and surprising experiences in finding them.

Respecting traditional Indigenous lifestyles

There's an unbroken connection between the modern Indigenous peoples in this area and their ancestors who trapped and travelled here thousands of years ago. One of these families maintains a trapline between

Bennett and Log Cabin, as well as a cabin at Bennett. We ask that you respect this lifestyle by not disturbing this family or their property during your travels. For this same reason, fishing anywhere on the Chilkoot Trail is prohibited to anyone who is not a local First Nations citizen.

Report issues

Winter users, particularly snowmobilers, are our eyes and ears on the land. Please help us ensure the Chilkoot Trail remains world-class by reporting anything unusual, including illegal activity or damage to trails

and buildings by contacting Parks Canada.

Other things to remember

- Dogs must be on leash at all times.
- Do not approach, disturb, feed or entice wildlife.
- Leave no trace, and take nothing but pictures.
- Hunting and possession of firearms are strictly prohibited.
- Bring your own firewood. All standing and dead wood on site is protected.
- Cabins at Lindeman are for day use only.
- \bullet Do not snow mobile on groomed ski trails adjacent to Log Cabin.
