Two very significant meetings took place in November. On November 3, I hosted the local snowmobile dealers for a lunch meeting. This was the inaugural meeting to what I hope becomes a semi-annual (pre-season and post-season) summit of the people who sell the sleds and the

people who work to maintain the privilege to ride the sleds. The meeting went very well and we saw eye-to-eye on many points. I won't get into the nitty-gritty but I trust you'll see the positive effects as we all work even closer together to provide the best possible snowmobile experience for Yukoners.

On November 7, we held our AGM. It was great to see a couple of the dealers attend the AGM. I thought they'd still be tired of listening to me speak so soon after the dealer meeting. As I have in the past, I took the opportunity before dissolving the board to review some of the accomplishments from the previous year. Here's a summary of the major points.



We've managed to keep a solid financial position. This is vitally important because granting agencies will not give money to an organization that is insolvent. It takes money to get money in this business so we always keep a healthy balance sheet to attract funding for our

major projects. We also keep money at hand to absorb operational costs such as insurance premiums and grooming expenses.

Membership levels are increasing slightly. Member benefits are an outstanding value. We have managed to make a great deal even better by partnering with the CCSO on national programs such as Mark's Work Wearhouse and Choice Hotels. I don't have another card in my wallet that pays so well. We have also managed to attract non-snowmobilers to the KSA. This is partly because of the great membership benefits, but also because we continue to do excellent work for the public-at-large by maintaining trails for everyone. We do this work with only a

### **Wolf Creek bridge** has grand opening

Editor's Note: The following is a reprint of the speech delivered by KSA president Mark Daniels at the official opening of the Peter Greenlaw Memorial Bridge at Wolf Creek on October 5, 2011.

Hello and welcome to the official opening of the Peter Greenlaw Memorial Bridge, I'm Mark Daniels, the president of the Klondike Snowmobile Association and head of the Trans Canada Trail in the Yukon. We've heard a lot of long speeches lately so I'll keep my comments brief.

This bridge is not about snowmobiling. This may sound funny coming from the president of the snowmobile association,



but it's true. Sure we'll use it, but it was also built to accommodate an ambulance, a fire truck or search and rescue vehicle, if needed. This bridge is really about community service, partnerships and environmental stewardship.

The opening of the Peter Greenlaw Memorial Bridge marks the 30th anniversary of the Klondike Snowmobile Association. That's 30 years of community service to the Yukon—not just the snowmobile community, but the community-at-large. The KSA is recognized as the steward of the multi-use trail system in the Whitehorse region and we're the territorial agent for the Trans Canada Trail.

A recent random phone survey indicated that over 90 per cent of Whitehorse residents use the organized trail system. That would make the trail system the most widely used recreational facility in the city. The KSA is proud to help provide this facility to the public. The Klondike Snowmobile Association had this

bridge built but we could not have done it without our partners. For their efforts on this project and the general operation of the association, I'd like to thank the KSA board of

The City of Whitehorse provided engineering and logistical support for this project. Thanks particularly to Doug Hnatiuk for his help on this project and for the ongoing productive relationship between the city and the KSA.

The Yukon Government's Community Development Fund and the Trans Canada Trail are major financial supporters of this project and the KSA generally. We could not have built this bridge without them. I'd also like to thank the contractor. Don Dixon at Glacier Dredge, and the consultant, Toos Omtzigt at Yucan Environmental Planning. Lastly, thank you to the community groups and businesses that supported the KSA in this project and our ongoing service to the community.

Wolf Creek is a salmon-bearing stream. The main intent of this bridge is to reduce the environmental impacts to the streambed and banks caused by recreational traf-

This project is part of a larger recreational bridge building program that the KSA and the city are working on together to reduce the environmental impacts of outdoor recreation, and includes the two bridges recently built over McIntyre Creek.

These values of community service, partnerships and environmental stewardship were very important to Peter Greenlaw, the former president of the KSA. This bridge was Peter's vision and it was one of the last things we spoke about prior to his untimely passing. It will stand in memory of his con-

handful of volunteers backed by some very generous local businesses that assist with fuel and equipment maintenance.

In addition to the routine work of running the KSA, we took on several projects this past year. The most evident of these was the Wolf Creek Bridge, the largest single piece of infrastructure ever installed by the association. We continued with the Trans Canada Trail (TCT) planning and connection project with assistance from our consultant, Yucan Environmental Planning. We represented snowmobilers on the Bylaw Task Force and continue to work with the City to implement a reasonable set of rules. We are working with the Yukon Conservation Society, Yukon Fish and Game Management Board, Yukon Off-Road Riders and others to produce an educational program for safe and responsible use of off-highway vehicles. At the request of the City, we also installed the signs on the new Crestview connector trail and have agreed to maintain it in the winter months only.

On top of all that, we managed to organize a couple of events. We partnered with the Women's Directorate on the annual KSA Charity Poker Run. We helped raise awareness on the issue of violence against women and we made a KSA record \$3,250 charitable donation to Kaushee's Place. We also hosted the annual KSA Family Ice Fishing Day. With all the other responsibilities of running the KSA and the TCT in the Yukon, we struggle to organize events. This is one area we could really use some help. We started a Facebook page and hope people will use this tool to post rides and work together to plan events and strengthen the snowmobile network in the Yukon.

### The Sled Dawgs look forward to winter

The Dawson City Sled Dawgs are looking forward to an exceptional winter with great snow, warm weather and good fun.

With the snow starting to build, we anxiously await hitting the trails with our new Arctic Cat Bear Cat Groomer Special. After great performance reviews and a new sleek look we decided to put our 550 Skandic to rest and support our long-term supporters, Lister's Motor Sports. The Sled Dawgs will now be hitting the trails with our Skandic 800 four-stroke and the Bear Cat four-stroke. We have found that the four-stroke technology not only delivers the power needed to pull our trail groomers, it gives us incredible savings with better fuel economy, And we no longer have to dump endless amounts of two-cycle oil into the machines.

During the 2011/2012 winter season, we hope to have various events starting with a Slide 'n Ride-great fun for all ages. It will be hosted by the Sled Dawgs who will be supplying hotdogs, smokies and hot chocolate. Families can come out to the Moose Mountain Ski Hill with their toboggans and take to the slopes with the Sled Dawgs carting people back up the hill on snow machines and sleighs.

With the colder temperatures setting in and the rivers starting to cover over with a thick layer of ice, we have hopes of putting in a trail system on the Klondike and Yukon

These trails, once in place, can be up to 26 kilometres in length spanning from Moose Hide, the Tr'ondek Hwech'in traditional territory five kilometres downriver from Dawson City, to the Sunnydale area upriver from Dawson connecting with the Klondike River. These trails, as always, will depend on safety as our Bombardier BR400 pulling its 8' x 20' drag can put a lot of stress on the ice.

If and once these trails are in place, they will be enjoyed by all user groups: crosscountry skiers, skijorers, dog mushers, and even people out for a nice walk as the Snow Cat leaves a very hard-packed, smooth trail.

As always, we are looking forward to the very well known Trek Over the Top, a fourday snowmobiling adventure from Tok, Alaska, to our hometown.

Upon arrival of our Alaskan and Lower 48 friends (and a few Mexicans-the jalapeno group) we do our best to provide true Klondike hospitality by hosting a poker run, amongst other events. Our poker run can be anywhere from 25 to 35 miles in length with a bonfire along the way where the participants can stop to have a delicious smokie washed down with northern-style hot chocolate. Upon completion of our poker run, the winners are announced at the banquet dinner held at Diamond Tooth Gerties. Prizes consist of cold hard cash and Sled Dawg apparel.

The Sled Dawgs club is a non-profit organization whose members like to promote outdoor recreation, motorized and nonmotorized. Please look us up on Facebook. We ask that when people are out on the trails, whether they are motorized or nonmotorized, they respect other user groups of those trails.
